County of Lake – Code Enforcement Mitigation Team

Explain how your project meets the definition of the eligible activity that you selected in the question above? (Public Service)

The County of Lake, Code Enforcement Division will utilize grant funds to expand Code Enforcement services to the areas of lake county will the most need. Specifically, the county currently supports 2 Code Enforcement Officer positions, whose designated to a specific area (Clearlake Oaks) of Lake County and are focused on nuisance abatement. The division also has a Code Enforcement Program Supervisor, who spends about 30% of his time on hazardous vegetation cases, largely focused on a specific community (Kelseyville Rivieras), whose HOAs organized a fund for hazardous vegetation abatements. This project would support a 2 Code Officer Mitigation Team whose sole focus will be on hazardous vegetation education, noticing, and abatements, as well as sub-standard housing assessments, noticing, referrals to the Housing Trust Fund, and abatements. The increase in Mitigation Code Enforcement will be from .3FTE Officer dedication to 3.0FTE from the proposed Mitigation Team (which includes a full-time Office Assistant to assist with education and noticing). Please explain justification for new or expanded services.

Lake County continues to be at extreme fire risk, as well as high risk for floods and earthquakes, as the climate continues to change. According to the 2023 Community Wildfire Prevention Plan (CWPP), since 2015 Lake County has lost more than 1800 homes to wildfire and an estimated 60% of Lake County has burned between 2011 and 2021. Hazardous Vegetation education, management and abatements are a major focus of the counties wildfire prevention plan – but the dedication of only .3FTE Code Officer with the focus on one Lake County Community requires expansion to be effective for true wild fire prevention. According to the most recent Local Hazard Mitigation Plan (LHMP), Lake County continues to be at extreme wildfire risk and high risk for floods and earthquakes. In a low income community, such as ours, a high percentage of the housing stock is sub-standard, and therefore vulnerable to fire, flood, and earthquake. With no current Code Enforcement activities focused on sub-standard housing, Lake County housing stock is at extreme risk in natural disasters. The proposed Code Enforcement Mitigation Team would focus 100% of efforts on hazardous vegetation and substandard housing cases across Lake County, specifically to "increase the resilience to disasters and reduce long term risk to loss of life and property" as defined by HUD.

Existing Code Enforcement services in Lake County do not meet demand, Lake County is third poorest county in California (according to 2020 census data), and is extremely under-resourced, with only 2 Code Enforcement Officers being funded through county resources (and 3 other officers being funded by grant funds and other revenue sources). Although there is no standard

staffing ratio for Code Enforcement per population (due to the unique nature of each county's program), 5 officers for a county of our size (population and geography) and number of cases is not currently meeting the demand, especially for hazardous vegetation and sub-standard housing needs. Although county collaboratives (like the Risk Reduction Authority and other agencies) have focused much effort and procured grant funds to provide disaster prevention education and organizing, Code Enforcement activities focused on mitigation are missing from the equation – and with no enforcement, segments of the community remain at great risk. Without greater county resources and increased tax base, the County of Lake is forced to seek grant funding to protect our community.

The target population for this project will be the residents of the unincorporated area of Lake County – the County of Lake Jurisdiction. The population of Lake County has remained relatively consistent over the last 25 years, only fluctuating by approximately 5% since 2010.

No fees will be assessed as the result of project activities. However, since grant funds can not be utilized to conduct abatements, Code enforcement will pass these costs to property owners through administrative penalties and liens, according to county ordinances. Our cost recovery process has built in options for low-income individuals, including an appeal process, a hardship waiver, and a payment plan. For those funds not recovered, Code Enforcement's nuisance abatement fund will cover the costs.

Project description:

County of Lake, Code Enforcement Division proposes to use grant funds to create a 2-Officer Mitigation Team – who will be focused on hazardous vegetation and sub-standard housing mitigation, directly related to fire prevention and housing loss mitigation in fire, flood, and earthquake events. The Code Enforcement Division currently employs 4 Code Officers, 2 assigned to traditional cases (i.e. illegal dumping, nuisance abatement), 2 assigned to illegal cannabis cases (grant-funded) and a Code Enforcement Program Supervisor who handles abandoned vehicles and hazardous vegetation (in Riviera communities only). The division also employees a Code Enforcement Manager who supervises the officers and works the most complex, high-profiles cases and handles litigation. By recruiting, hiring and training 2 officers dedicated to mitigation effort, Code Enforcement will be able to make an impact on fire prevention and disaster recovery. The Code Enforcement Mitigation team will assess the community and develop cases from community complaints, focusing their case management on hazardous vegetation education, noticing and abatement as well as sub-standard housing violations, education, and connection to County rehabilitation funds. We will track our cases through data tracking software, review data monthly and report as required. We will assess administrative penalties and liens to property owners to recover our costs (according to current

county ordinance) from those residents who have the financial means. As with all our Code Enforcement work, we will first for property owner compliance with county code. We will educate property owners about their responsibilities, and encourage everyone to bring their property into compliance voluntarily. For sub-standard housing cases, our team will encourage and connect residents with the County's Housing Rehabilitation Fund (currently being developed). Our Office Assistant will send mailers, courtesy letters, and will also track cost recovery efforts.
