#### The California Legislature

Senate: 32 Democrats, 8 Republicans (supermajority+5)

Assembly: 62 Democrats, 18 Republicans (supermajority+8)

Senate President pro Tem: Mike McGuire (Healdsburg)

**Assembly Speaker: Robert Rivas (Salinas)** 

Priorities: housing, homelessness, climate & housing bonds, retail theft, water, behavioral and mental health

#### **Election Results**

Proposition 1 – MH/BH bond plus significant MHSA reform Yes - 50.4%, No – 49.6%

- 11 Senators retiring, 1 more trying to (30% total)
- 19 Assembly Members retiring, 5 moving to Senate (30% total)

50% of Senate is new across 2022 & 2024 45% of Assembly is new across 2022 & 2024

#### State Budget Deficit

\$73 billion budget deficit, made worse by IRS deadline delay

Significant cut proposals: Large K-12 reductions, \$1.2 billion to housing programs, \$4.6 billion in climate/resource programs

Also significant funding delays in many areas, including BHCIP and last-mile broadband grants (but future broadband \$ is increased)

#### **Budget Effects on Counties**

CalWORKs cuts – Single Allocation, Family Stabilization, Expanded Subsidized Employment

**Family Urgent Response System – eliminated** 

SB 678 Incentive Grants, Public Defender Resentencing Grants

**Cut for CalHome and delays for many housing programs**

# Bills of Interest: Climate & Resources Bonds

#### **AB 1567 (Garcia) and SB 867 (Allen)**

- ~\$5 billion Drought, flood, water
- ~\$2.5 billion Wildfire and forests
- ~\$2 billion Clean energy
- ~\$2 billion Coastal protection
- ~\$1.5 billion Biodiversity / Nature-based solutions
- ~\$1.2 billion Regional climate resilience projects
- ~\$0.5 to \$1.5 billion Extreme heat
- ~\$0.5 billion Parks
- ~\$0.5 billion Farms and ag

#### ~\$16 billion total...for now

## Bills of Interest: Wildfire

**AB 1951 (Fong)** – CEQA exemption for wildfire prevention within 50 feet of a road

**AB 3150 (Quirk-Silva)** – More public review of fire hazard severity zone maps, and a redesignation process

**SB 1003 (Dodd)** – Requires IOU wildfire mitigation plans to ensure that the maximum amount of risk from utility-sparked wildfires is reduced in the shortest amount of time

# Bills of Interest: Other Topics

**AB 2871 (Maienschein) –** Allows counties to create overdose fatality review teams

**AB 817 (Pacheco)** – Advisory bodies, remote participation for Brown Act meetings

**AB 2514 (Aguiar-Curry) –** Exempts counties under 70,000 from organics diversion targets

**AB 2561 (McKinnor) –** Vacancy rates > 10%: county must meet and confer, implement plan to fill all vacant positions in 6 months
