Chapter 4 Grading – Grading Non-Compliance and Mitigation Nullification

A. Ministerial vs. Discretionary; Accurate, Stable, Finite Record

Principle

The ISMND discusses the need for a complex grading permit for the project [A1]. CEQA doesn't apply to truly ministerial approvals; it does apply once discretionary permitting is implicated or foreseeable. Where a complex (discretionary) grading permit is recognized, analyzed, then removed before adoption, the agency must maintain an accurate, stable, finite project description and recirculate if substantial revisions/new information would deprive the public of meaningful comment [A2]. Project applicant violated Lake County Code by grading without appropriate permits and within scope of project documentation [A3].

Argument — What the Record Shows

- 1. Baseline & Early Disturbance (2018–2021)
 - Historical images show the property as a mostly undeveloped, natural landscape with dirt roads and trails until the Mendocino Complex Fire in August 2018 (Figure B1). Post-fire imagery shows substantial remaining vegetation and intact landforms, including native oak trees and chaparral on premises (Figure B2). It also shows the property unchanged since before the fire-- contradicting applicant's claim that part of the cannabis area he wants to develop was used as a firebreak and dozed after the Complex fire, and that there would be no cutting or filling [A4].

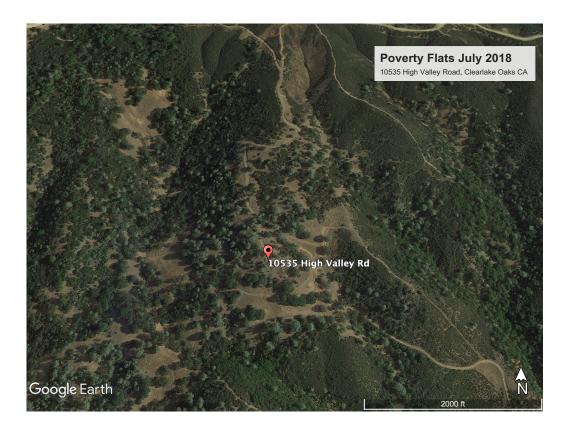

 By April 18, 2021 aerials (Figure B3) capture grading/trenching and tree removal before any grading permit or Lake Streambed Alteration Agreement, while applicant emails seek permits for canopy preparation after grading began [A5]. Applicant stated that CalFire graded fire breaks after the Mendocino Complex Fire but aerial imagery shows otherwise [A6].

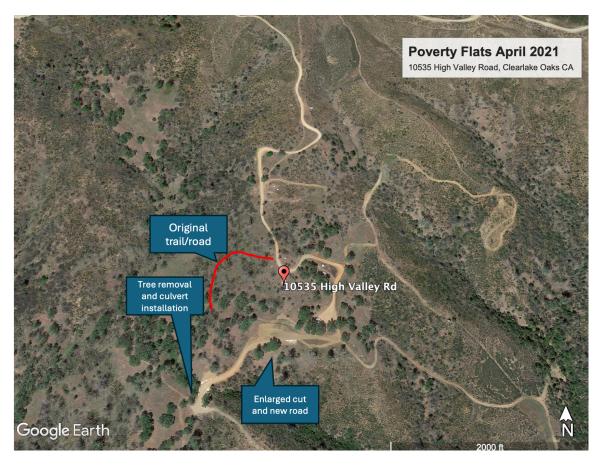

2. GR22-12 (Ministerial) — Text vs. Field Conditions (2022)

- Permit GR22-12 "with conditions" (issued 4/14/2022) authorizes "clearing and maintenance of existing firebreak" and "road maintenance/widening to 4290 only in <20% slopes and areas wide enough" with "minimal soil disturbance." Public Records Request returned no requested copy of permit conditions. [A7]
- Subsequent imagery and cultural documentation show pad cuts, widened benches, and ~3-ft trenches aligned to cultivation areas—characteristic of complex grading, not ministerial maintenance. [A8] (Figures B4, B5, B6)

- Tribal Historic Preservation Officer met with project applicant on October 30, 2023 but no agreement was reached on contract to oversee ground disturbance activities that could negatively affect cultural resources. [A9]
- The Preliminary Grading Plan, dated October 17, 2023, clearly shows the site layout and cultivation areas for the cannabis project and documents solar arrays, electrical panels, and water line trenching locations. [A10]

3. County Recognizes Complexity; Then Removes It (Dec 2024–Apr 2025)

- The county discusses the grading activity and attempts to incorporate the grading that has been done "A complex grading process will be necessary for this project, and management is currently exploring options to incorporate the grading permit."
 [A11].
- Complex Grading Permit GR25-01 was issued January 9, 2025 for ~7,450 CY
 earthwork, culvert/trenching [A12]. The ISMND dated January 6, 2025 incorporates
 the complex permit and references an existing 18" HDPE culvert [A13]. This is the
 version that was uploaded to CEQA on January 9, 2025 with the Preliminary Grading
 Plans and other documents.
- On January 9, 2025 staff email requests voiding GR25-01. [A14]

- March 24, 2025 Email from Tod Elliott to Max Stockton citing Sec.30-17. Exemptions 30-17.4.13 Grading for water well pads or utilities [A15]. This additional
 and separate grading activity should have been incorporated in the total of the
 project and constitutes a piecemealing of the project components which violates
 several CEQA guidelines [A16].
- May 22, 2025 Planning packet presents a redlined IS/MND [A17] omitting GR25-01 while retaining intensive infrastructure descriptions—a material change from circulation to adoption. That redlined version dated April 25, 2025 was subsequently reworked to incorporate the changes and uploaded to CEQA on May 27, 2025 without the reference to GR 25-01 and without the Preliminary Grading Plans [A1].

4. "Fire Suppression" vs. Irrigation Narrative; PRA Gaps (2024–2025)

- Internal email (6/2/2025) asserts trenching occurred "under a valid well permit for... fire suppression/water supply" [A18] —yet no inspection report was produced in response to PRA [A19].
- Applicant/consultant submittals and plan legends depict water lines, risers, and irrigation infrastructure for cultivation—not purely fire suppression [A10].
- PRA responses failed to provide records substantiating key County claims (prior ag activity; inspection notes; trench approvals).

5. Cultural/Tribal, Biological, Fire, Hydrology, Erosion Consequences

- Cultural/Tribal: Cultural assessment documents heavy machinery grading and ~3-ft trenches; no tribal monitoring agreement was executed [A8]. Tribal Historical Preservation Officer stated in an email July 24, 2025 that he has not been contacted for grading—nullifying TCR-1 mitigation [A20].
- Biological: Early biological work flagged ephemeral channels, survey windows, and permitting needs (SAA/CWA) before ground disturbance—undercut by unpermitted grading/trenching. The ISMND states "the BA did note that construction activities or tree removal activities could impact special-status bird species. Therefore, if construction activities or tree removal activities (if any) occur during the nesting season (February through August), a pre-construction survey for the presence of special-status bird species and nesting bird species should occur." nullification of BIO-1 mitigation. [A21]
- Hydrology/Schindler Creek: Public complaints (6/6/2024) warned of potential Hitch habitat impact; trenching/culverts intersect drainage paths. [A22]

- Hydrology & Water Quality (Impact WQ-1/WQ-2): The unpermitted/ministerial-only grading altered on-site drainage patterns, increased runoff rates and volumes, and introduced uncontrolled sediment sources by removing vegetation and compacting pads/roads without the complex-permit BMPs and inspections disclosed in the circulated IS/MND. These changes invalidate the hydrologic assumptions underlying the April IS/MND and constitute significant new information requiring recirculation (Guidelines §15073.5). Absent reinstatement of the complex-permit framework (or equivalent enforceable measures) to size culverts, stabilize outlets, and control erosion, substantial evidence does not support a less-than-significant finding for hydrology and water quality [A23].
- Fire/4290: GR22-12 invoked 4290 but expressly limited work to <20% slopes with minimal disturbance; the later "fire suppression trench" claim is inconsistent with irrigation-labeled plans and missing inspection documentation.
- Erosion Controls: The Preliminary Grading Plans identified a licensed civil engineer and general contractor responsible for implementation and certifying erosioncontrol measures. Site disturbance proceeded without their documented participation, inspection logs, or certification, rendering the grading unpermitted under County Code §30-6 and inconsistent with CEQA's enforceable mitigation framework.

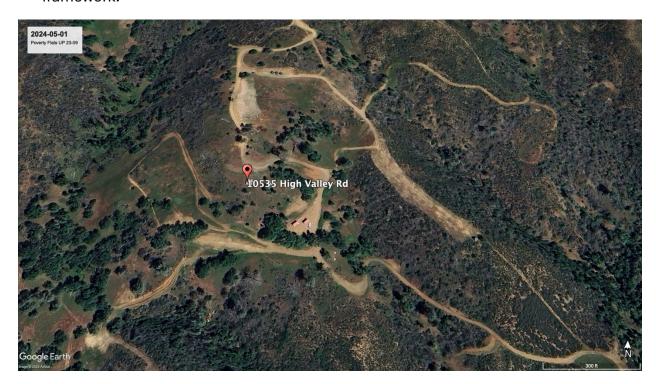

Conclusion — Basis for Denial

The County's handling of the Poverty Flats project represents a pattern of material misrepresentation and procedural failure that undermines the integrity of the CEQA process. By recognizing complex grading (GR25-01) within *UP 23-09 ISMND.pdf* and then voiding and omitting that permit framework at adoption, the County effectively segmented a discretionary component, destabilized the project description, and nullified enforceable mitigation measures tied to erosion control, hydrology, fire safety, biological resources, and Tribal Cultural Resources.

The record demonstrates repeated departures from required professional oversight, inconsistent or falsified statements in staff reports, and the selective removal of evidence from the environmental record. These actions prevented meaningful public participation and violated CEQA's fundamental requirement of a stable, accurate, and transparent project description.

Because the environmental review was corrupted by omissions, unverified claims, and procedural irregularities, the Board cannot lawfully rely on the adopted ISMND as substantial evidence. The appropriate remedy is not recirculation but denial—the project, as processed, fails to meet the minimum statutory requirements for environmental disclosure, mitigation enforceability, and public safety.

Accordingly, the Board should deny the project approval in its entirety, direct staff to correct the record, and require any future application to undergo a new, truthful, and comprehensive review consistent with CEQA, Public Resources Code §§ 21000–21092, and Title 14 CCR §§ 15125–15164.
