

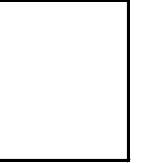

Currently, land use guidance is scattered across eight separate Planning Area elements, which creates fragmentation and makes it difficult to understand the countywide policy direction.	Declined: This change not permitted by the current Scope of Work.

WR-1)	Betsy Cawn	GPAC	1st page, 2nd paragraph: The paragraph fails to identify the County's responsibilities for water and watershed protection under federal laws, when it says the County "is involved," refers to the Stormwater Management Plan (a US EPA regulatory compliance program document), and then refers the reader to goals, policies, and actions that address stormwater runoff. Stormwater exists briefly as precipitation but profoundly as the source of groundwater recharge, for which the floodplain is critical but competes with anthropogenically-defined purposes. See comments about enabling the Watershed Protection District, above.	Declined: The specific reference could not be located in the document.
	Background	Clear Lake description (p. WR-2)	Margaux Kambara	GPAC	Cite Pomo name for Clear Lake, "(known traditionally as Xa'batin or Lupeyomi). 	Background	Big Valley Groundwater Basin (p. WR-3)	Margaux Kambara	GPAC	Big Valley Groundwater Basin – storage capacity cited. Usable storage is the relevant term and volume to cite. CA Water Resources Bulletin 118 defines usable storage capacity as the amount of groundwater of suitable quality that can be economically withdrawn from storage. A groundwater basin's useable storage capacity may be only a fraction of its total gross storage capacity. This is important because, as more groundwater is extracted, groundwater levels may fall below some existing wells, which may then require replacement or deepening. Evaluation of groundwater supply and availability require consideration of safe yield: "Amount of water which can be withdrawn without: - Exceeding in any calendar year the water supply of the basin - Lowering water levels so as to make further drilling of water wells uneconomical - Causing water pumped from the basin to deteriorate below drinking water standards" [Lake County Code of Ordinances Chapter 28 – Groundwater Article II – Definitions. Sec. 28.2 – Definitions 2.20]	Accepted: Updated text addresses the requested changes.

WR-7)	Carolyn Hillman	GPAC	the Water Demand section (page WR-7) notes that 82% of the County's water demand is agricultural, but it totally lacks a crop-level breakdown. For context, winegrapes make up about 73% of our County's total gross agricultural value, yet we don't have specific water demand data for vineyards, pears, or cannabis. We need to amend this section to require the County to track water demand across all major agricultural commodities so we are planning with real data.	Declined: No nexus for this requirement at this time. Ag Department and Farm Bureau may have that information.

Carolyn Hillman	GPAC	The framework for water availability on Major/Minor Use Permits leans too heavily on applicant-funded hydrology studies, which often results in biased or inconsistent reporting. We need universal rules based on empirical water usage data, not what kind of crop is being grown.	Declined: Bias and inconsistency is supposed, not confirmed. Standards for hydrology studies in process for future zoning code update.
	WR-1.7		Margaux Kambara	GPAC	For major/minor use permits, water availability is not determined by an independent hydrologist. Instead, the permit applicant selects and pays for the studies required for the permit; the permit applicant's report contractors are conflicted. They have a vested interest to produce or report results and conclusions favorable to the client's (permit applicant) project. For at least one project, it is known that the permit applicant "shopped" for the study outcomes desired. For at least four projects, the same consultant who prepared the hydrology report did not use consistent reporting standards, depending upon the desired outcome for the client. Details can be provided upon request. Standards for hydrological studies required by major/minor use permits not identified. Consequently, hydrological reports received are inconsistent. Hydrology report required elements should be identified. A report template would help produce consistent data. An environmental professional with 30 years of experience made these recommendations to the Planning Commission (12 Jun 2025). For example, basin-wide hydrological studies are not required. When aquifer characteristics and basin connectivity are uncertain, California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) requires binding, threshold-based mitigation framework for an approved project. Betsy Cawn	GPAC	Citations for illegal discharge require definition and application to major industries with impacts on watershed and water supply systems; invasive plants and mussels are illegal discharges with massive potential impact but the least costly penalty and minimal operational funding. The City of Clearlake has failed to correct major drainage systems that contribute to the intensity of pollution in the Lower Arm of the Lake [specific details available in abundance]; Lake County Sanitation District has contributed significant levels of pollution but not only isn't funded to make corrections, but pays no fines for unmaintained system failures. We are also having security issues. Our park has entrance and exit security gates, but now that we no longer have an onsite owner we have been left with gates that are not working properly and no one onsite to fix them. Thus, we have experienced a huge uptick in thefts throughout the park by thieves and vagrants that enter at will. So, if protections are not put in place to prevent space rent gouging in mobile parks, and particularly senior parks, many in Lake County will be left homeless.
