WHY THIS OLD BUILDING?

2002: Caltrans had plans to widen HWY 29 between Lower Lake and Kelseyville. 2003: A historic resource evaluation was



made of the proposed highway alignment. Although this building was evaluated, Caltrans decided it was not significant enough to warrant preservation. It was scheduled for demolition.

IS IT SIGNIFICANT? The Community Thought So

Upon hearing of its potential demise, the community rallied to obtain support for moving the historic structure.



The previous owner donated \$100,000, the current owner donated 5 acres, and the county provided the funds for moving and restoring the stage stop back to its original form.

A STAGE STOP'S SECOND LIFE

In 2006, work began on preparing the house for the move. Over the years, several additions had been built on to the original 1860 structure. These had to be removed before the building could be moved.



A STAGE STOP'S SECOND LIFE

Lifted off its foundation and placed on wheels, the building was pulled across HWY 29, through the valley, and up the hill to its new location.

Finally, July 24th 2011, the opening ceremony was held.

The Lake County Historical Society stepped up and agreed to operate the museum for the county.




The Jamison Lost Springs Ranch

1859: Mary and James Jamison and their 4 children moved into the Valley and called it home for 14 years. It is likely that the Jamison family




built the original ranch house in the 1860's. It served as their house, a horse changing station, and a public stop-over. They also raised stock and farmed.

IS IT SIGNIFICANT?

The Jamison Lost Springs Ranch

1860's: Ranchers from all over the Clear Lake Basin would herd their cattle to the Jamison Place where they were kept in large corrals

awaiting the big cattle drive over Mount St. Helena to Calistoga.



The Town of Ely

1873: James Jamison sells the Lost Springs Ranch and moves into Kelseyville where he is elected County Supervisor.


1878: Benjamin Ely receives a U.S. Patent on 120 acres of the Lost Springs Ranch including the old Jamison Place.



The Town of Ely

1880's: Soon the small horse changing station and stopover house grew into a full service stage stop, public house, post office, and local school. Benjamin Ely's daughter Sarah "Sallie Ann" Ely married James McClure.

As Mr. Ely was busy running his farm near Winters, James and Sally Ann moved to Lake County and ran the "Town of Ely".


When it was discovered that the 1890's Kelseyville Jail was being vandalized, the Ely Museum agreed to take on the moving and restoration of the jail.




PLANS FOR THE FUTURE

We have a 5-year "build-out" plan for the Ely Museum grounds.

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One of the big priorities was to use the new museum as a way to further the Historical Society's mission:

"to encourage education, preservation and interpretation of cultural <u>resources (including historic structures</u> prehistoric sites, and places





Once the basic operation was organized, we opened the doors to schools. educational groups. and civic clubs.



Outside community groups are also able to use the facility for special events. Over the years, the museum grounds have hosted events for fire victim fund raising, Women in Agriculture, Retired Teachers Association, Boy Scouts, 4H, Wine Grape Association, Master Gardeners, Rotary, and many more.



The Ely Stage Stop has become a popular place for weddings, proms, memorial celebrations, and other family events.



The Ely Museum has a volunteer staff of more than 20. The most active meet every month to plan new projects and new activities to bring Lake County history alive for the public.

The volunteers put in at least 3,000 hours a year staffing the museum on weekends and conducting special educational programs.

They also get together a few times a year just to party and have fun.



Whenever we have enough volunteers, we will dress up, grab the hay wagon or stage coach, and join parades around the county.



A few years ago, we received permission from the landowner, set up a grid system and began archaeological work at the original Stage Stop location.



Who Visits the Ely Museum?

Currently, the Ely Museum gets about 3,000 visitors a year.

In addition to local folks, our sign-in book indicates that we have received visitors from at least 13 countries, 34 states, and 142 California cities.
