Limiting one Oak tree to every 5,000 square feet would present a fire hazard. Because Oak trees grow up to be pretty large two Oak trees confined within a 10,000 square feet (5,000 sq, ft. each ) area the end result could likely end up resulting with more "back to back "Oak trees.

If they are back to back Bush Oaks like below 15628 19th Ave. one tree on fire would have a domino effect with one tree after another rapidly igniting flames thereby increasing a fire at an accelerated rate of speed. In other words a fire would jump from tree to tree in seconds so now instead of one tree on fire you have 20 trees on fire all in less then a minute.

Therefore, limiting it down to one Oak tree to every 10,000 square feet minimum Instead of every 5,000 square feet would reduce the probability of fires from rapidly increasing slowing any fire down.

I don't have time to explain why but there can be no changes to laws that were pre exsisting but complying to these regulations will set a new precedence for, Lake County.

The pre exsisting laws have already been put in place and there can be no changes but by using these newer code code enforcement guidelines property owners should now have the option of being able to remove multiple Oak trees down to one oak tree for every 10,000 square feet to help stop or slow the proliferation of fires in, Lake County ..

Follow my direction and I will make Clearlake and this County a safer and better place for everyone.
