Dear Chairperson Smith,

A healthy business community equates to a healthy community for all residents.

The Chamber and its members do feel that Lake County is a special place. Here, we treasure family values and a strong sense of community while striving to be good stewards of the land. Lake County's future will be vibrant by creating a community where all members are connected to those around them and by realizing that their success and well being are dependent on the success of all others. Here, we actively protect and enhance our natural beauty, resources, and environment.

The Chambers' vision is to champion free enterprise, a healthy business environment and economic prosperity for all of Lake County citizens. The Chamber is a business organization that works with the County of Lake to improve the business climate *for all sizes of business* from a multi-industry perspective. This includes chain and box stores, corporations large and small plus sole proprietors. What we accomplish will be and is good for all businesses, and that's good for the Lake County economy.

Most Lake county residents want and deserve a broad array of choices, so they can identify those that best fit their own individual or family needs. These choices expand when we allow free enterprise to foster and not smother it with a negative business climate ideology.

Throughout the year, the chamber will monitor new business investments projects, review government policies and regulations to protect and enhance the ability of businesses to operate successfully in Lake County. Members will meet face-to-face with county policymakers and government officials to inform and educate them about the importance of supporting business.

Food for Thought:

The Chamber is sorry but we feel that it is not the fees that have prevented business development in this county, but rather it is the process that a business has to go through that has created a negative business climate. This requires that we be <u>brutally honest in our appraisal</u> of our county general plan and each of the area plans. We feel that these plans have contributed too, to the process that a business has to go through working with each of the departments that have to implement these plans that have created a negative business climate.

In business there is a saying "Eliminate Exit Barriers". Everyone is aware of R.O.I. (Return on Investment), but what about C.O.I.? This means COST OF INACTION. What is the cost of delayed results from not taking actions to improve or approve? If a project is submitted and deemed 'complete' by the Community Development Department, why is the developer then inundated with pages of requests/requirements that negate the 'complete' designation they were previously given? The attitude of the CDD and all departments needs to be 'how can we help and make this work'?

The time has come, as stated earlier, to conduct a brutally honest appraisal of the current plans that guide this county's economic growth or lack thereof. The effect of these plans has been to reduce County revenues which is reflective not just to services provided to the community but in not keeping many of the experienced individuals in the department. It should be noted that the County of Lake is not the only county that is experiencing this type of attrition due to budget constraints. The Chamber contends that it is within the power of the County to change this direction, sooner than later.

At this point, the Chamber wants the Board to know of the concerns we have for the process that the **Maha Development project of the Guenoc Valley** and others that would benefit the County appear to have to go through. We cannot stress enough the support we have for these projects and the importance of moving them through the process in an expedient manner. We also have concerns over the time it is taking to rebuild **Harbin Hot Springs** and the lack of agreement between the County and the City of Lakeport over the water and sewer of South Main Street area.

The Chamber has concerns over the handling of other business development projects throughout our county. Expedient feedback to those paying permit fees on the status of their applications appears to be an issue. Many times the applicant does not hear back in a timely manner on their project status unless they call the department which is a concern. Anyone has the right to come into our county to purchase or lease a property and set up a business that meets the zoning for the property. The current message to the outside world (ie: potential developers) is that Lake County is not business friendly so stay away.

In closing, the Chamber would like to provide food for thought, business and economics principles within a context of individual liberty. Our communities understand that free societies are characterized by voluntary exchange, and that a way to measure success in such a system is through profits. Those who offer goods and services in the marketplace that are valued by their customers are rewarded with the customer's business. However, success in a free market goes far beyond the dollars. It is measured in the quality of life people enjoy.
